

In-person Poster Meetup Guidelines for Advocates

GRASP Poster Meetups are <u>in-person</u> discussions at select cancer conferences, where patient advocates and researchers walk the poster session together, giving researchers a chance to connect directly with those their work aims to help.

Below is an overview of each role in a session:

Patient Advocate	A person whose life has been impacted by cancer, whether as a patient or caregiver
GRASP Mentor	An experienced patient advocate serving as the session's <i>facilitator</i> and point person
GRASP Scientist	A clinician or researcher serving as an <i>interpreter</i> to help explain the science in simpler terms
Poster Author	A clinician or researcher serving as the presenter of a scientific poster selected by GRASP

Session Overview:

Each session typically includes 2–4 patient advocates, a GRASP Mentor, Poster Author(s), and if available, a GRASP Scientist. Groups walk the poster session together, and stop at specific posters to discuss the research.

How to Prepare:

- Watch the <u>instructional videos</u> to understand the session format and your role.
- Review the <u>conference page</u> for participants and assigned posters (if any).

 GRASP Mentors (and Scientists, if participating) may connect with you prior to the event, but they will also be easy to identify during the conference.

Day-of Instructions:

- Arrive at the GRASP Poster Meetup sign at the start of the poster session.
- Find your GRASP Mentor who will be holding up a small GRASP sign.
- Walk as a group to your assigned posters to begin the discussion. If posters are not pre-assigned, decide together which posters to review.

Tips for a Meaningful Discussion:

- Introduce yourself and share your advocacy or research interests.
- Ask questions when you need clarification or want to learn more.
- Share personal experiences that relate to the poster topic
- Be mindful of "airtime" so everyone has the chance to contribute.
- Respectfully interrupt for further explanation or if you'd like to offer insight.
- If a poster is busy, consider visiting one with fewer people first.
- Do not ask for medical advice.

Frequently Asked Questions:

- Will there be GRASP Scientists participating? It depends on the conference. If not, poster authors, who are also scientists, will explain the research.
- Will there be poster assignments? This varies. You will be notified if so, otherwise, groups choose which posters they want to review.
- How many posters should the groups review? Typically, groups review 2 posters in a 90-minute session, but the number can vary.
- What if there is no poster author present? We recommend focusing on the posters with an author available. If possible, note contact information so GRASP can try to coordinate a future discussion.
- Can others join our discussion? Yes! Invite them to listen in and encourage them to become GRASP members. Mentors can share a QR code for joining.
